DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

Targeted exploration of 3ds Max for theatrical designers focusing on scenery, lighting and some media.

GOALS:

This course is a skills-based course in 3ds Max. This is *not* a design class. Assessment will be based on design communication as it relates to creating digital environments using the designs of others.

- 1) Develop an understanding of 3ds Max especially as it relates to creating digital environments.
- 2) Explore digital presentation styles especially as they relate to design collaboration.
- 3) Improve communication skills especially as they relate to digital presentation.
- 4) Cultivate critical assessment skills especially as they relate to the evaluation of your own work.

REQUIREMENTS:

You will be required to complete specific projects in individually distinct areas.

Each phase of a project's process will be discussed and critiqued in class – in fact will, on presentation days, be the class content. Your participation in these discussions is very important, and will be part of each project's grade. In other words, your attendance and participation is required at all class sessions.

CLASS ATTENDANCE:

- Attendance is **Mandatory** and will be taken at each session. Being present and receptive to the information, discussions, and critiques presented during class sessions is essential to the successful completion of the course. More than one (2) absences will result in the lowering of your semester's grade by .25 of a grade point. Each additional unexcused absence will lower your semester grade by .25 of a grade point.
- University sanctioned activities and religious holidays are understood with appropriate documentation prior to the event. If documentation concerning an absence due to an unforeseen life circumstance is provided, the instructor will take it into consideration. However, there will be no distinction made between excused and unexcused absences.
